As Bethany Christian Services' new president and CEO, I am honored to continue Bethany's mission and vision that began almost 75 years ago. Thank you for your faith in us. Chris Palusky, President, CEO s a single mother of two children, Jennifer* was working two jobs to provide for her children's needs. When she discovered she was pregnant again, she was angry with herself.

"I wasn't planning to have any more children," Jennifer said. "I was doing okay with my kids, but I had no idea how I was going to take care of another baby. I didn't know what to do."

She learned about Bethany during a visit with her doctor. In a step of faith, she followed up with a pregnancy counselor to talk. Jennifer shared her story with the counselor and expressed her uncertainty about parenting another child.

"Because of [Bethany's support], I was able to make the decision to parent my baby. This wouldn't have been possible without help from the Life Impact Fund."

But the counselor assured me Bethany could help and told me the main goal was to keep my stress low, so my baby could have a stronger start to life."

When Jennifer needed to reduce her work hours during her pregnancy, the Life Impact Fund helped to cover the cost of her rent. "I needed emotional support, but I also needed financial help, and Bethany provided those things," Jennifer said.

hen Marvin and Lydianne began considering adoption, one of their biggest concerns was the expense.

"It looked so overwhelming to us, but we decided to step out in faith and let God work out the details," Lydianne said.

"God laid it on generous hearts to give. We could not have done it on our own."

Six months later, after many ups and downs, they received a call about a 5-week-old baby girl born with significant medical needs.

"We were thrilled to learn that we'd finally been chosen to be parents to this precious little one."

Two weeks later, the couple brought daughter Kara into their home. She underwent a successful surgery for hydrocephalus a condition that results in excess fluid on the brain—and made a quick recovery.

B orn in the Democratic Republic of Congo and shortly before the outbreak of civil war, Abdoul lost both of his parents at a very young age. He lived as an orphan with his siblings and grandmother until they made the decision to go to Rwanda as refugees.

> Life was challenging in Rwanda. At 7 years old, Abdoul had to learn a new culture, a new language, and a new way of life, and only received enough food to eat once a day.

> > "We had no country, no home, no identity, and no right to work," Abdoul said. "I lived

in refugee camps, and it felt like my life meant nothing on this earth. I had no hope for tomorrow."

After years of prayers and living in the camps, Abdoul and his siblings were offered asylum in the United States and arrived a year later. A Bethany case manager and Abdoul's foster parents were there to welcome him when he got off the plane. Abdoul's faith enabled him to embrace the unknown and acknowledge the life God had been preparing for him.

"When I arrived at the airport, I met people who opened up their hearts,

their homes, their cars, and their lives to me just so I could rebuild my life," Abdoul said. "My foster parents taught me how to be a man of purpose, how to help those who need help."

Bethany provided trauma counseling and life-learning support to help Abdoul and his siblings adjust to a new culture. "Refugees come to this country without knowledge of how to build new lives," Abdoul said.

Abdoul is now enrolled in college and studying international relations with concentrations in human rights and political science.

"I wouldn't be here if it wasn't for Bethany's support and the help they continue to show me and many other fellow refugees."

When they consulted with a cardiovascular doctor, they were warned that the costs of surgery would present a financial hardship for their family. But Dan and Annette believed it was God's work for them, and they were willing to do it.

"Clara wouldn't have received the surgery she needed without adoption, so we had to get her out of the orphanage and into a family," Annette said. One year later, Annette was preparing for an advocacy trip to China when she saw a picture of a young boy, Lewis, diagnosed with the same heart condition as Clara. The couple felt God had prepared them to be Lewis's parents and decided to step out in faith once more by adopting Lewis and welcoming him into their family and home.


Dan and Annette knew both children would need special care, including open heart surgery. After undergoing successful heart surgeries, the two 3-year-olds are now thriving and enjoying their preschool classes. "Throughout this process, we've seen God's hand providing for us in many ways," Annette said.

eith and Sally were young when they married and started their family. As their children became teenagers, their home was filled with their kids' friends, and they enjoyed spending time with the teens.

When Keith and Sally entered "empty nest" years, they missed the energy and excitement of having teens in the house. They became licensed foster parents and welcomed Paul, an 18-yearold refugee from the Democratic Republic of the Congo. They got to know some of Paul's friends from the transitional living home where he'd been living, and they realized the need for families for older teens.

They continued to grow their family through foster care adoption with TJ (16) and Dominick (15). Both boys had experienced multiple placements and dissolved adoptions and needed the stability of a family.

A few years later, Anson (14) joined the family from Hong Kong. He'd spent eight years in foster care in Hong Kong, but his future was uncertain. At the age of 18, he would "age out" of foster care and lose access to services for his disabilities.

"Before this experience, we were blind to the needs of older children who need families," Keith said.

"You hear about teens in foster care and think they'll cope somehow. But they need someone to call them on their birthday or someone to talk to when they're having a bad day. The idea of loving others and giving special care to those who don't have fathers is woven throughout Scripture. We have a window right now to make a difference for these boys."

It's more challenging as a single parent, and harder still when you are battling postpartum depression. Without a job or a support system, Shanice felt overwhelmed. "I found myself crying all the time," Shanice said. "I felt helpless."

Shanice was afraid that she could permanently lose custody of her children, but a social worker at her hospital told her about Safe Families for Children (SFFC). Shanice was uncertain at first. She had never been away from her children before and her youngest was only 4 weeks old at the time.

Her fears were calmed when she met Shane and Kris, the SFFC host family, who would be caring for her children while she got back on her feet. "From the day I met them, I could tell they were really nice people," Shanice said.

With new faith and confidence in the SFFC ministry, Shanice was able to

take important steps toward building a future for herself and her children. Over the next three weeks, she received treatment for her depression, found a job, and was able to arrange for long-term child care. Shanice was able to see her children whenever she wanted, and the host family regularly sent photos of her children so she could feel included in their day-to-day activities.

"There aren't enough words to express the way I feel about the experience," Shanice said. "I felt so much stronger with Shane and Kris' support.

"It feels good to have support from people who love and care for you."


Mehret feared for her children as she watched them become malnourished and withdrawn. By faith, she sought help and was soon referred to Bethany's family preservation and empowerment program.

With support from sponsors, the family received nutritious food and medical care. Mehret received help with child care so she could find a job that would provide for her young family.

Sponsorship was transformational for this family. The twins, now healthy, attend day care while Mehret goes to work. She now has hope for the future, and she dreams that both of her children will receive an education.
